COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Examines why some people take advantage of disasters and commit crimes. Assesses strategies about how crimes during natural and man-made disasters can be prevented.

This course supports EKU Quality Enhancement Program initiatives toward developing informed, critical and creative thinkers who communicate effectively.

STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Through readings, in-class discussions, exercises, simulations, case studies, oral and written assignments and group projects, students will be able to:

- 1. **Describe** historical disasters and crimes associated with those events.
- 2. **Explain** the various types of fraud utilized in disasters.
- 3. Assess how looting becomes an expected behavior.
- 4. **Describe** the role of Non-Governmental Organizations in disaster recovery.
- 5. **Explain** policies, guidelines, and standards that can be put in place to prevent crimes.
- 6. **Describe** the long term effects that disasters can have on crimes.
- 7. **Employ** advanced critical thinking skills in assessing course readings and in preparation of course assignments.
- 8. **Employ** written communication skills in developing individual papers on topics in crimes in disasters.

Course Central Question: What are the best procedures and techniques for preventing crime at a disaster scene?

COURSE METHODOLOGY:

This is an online course using EKU's Blackboard Learning System. Students should have a good working knowledge of Blackboard. This course will consist of weekly readings, discussion boards, writing assignments and examinations as detailed in the **Course Outline.** The course follows the active approach to learning where students are expected to participate in course activities. Assignments must be submitted on dates due.

ASSIGNMENTS:

Exams: We will have an exam for each "part" of the course. You should expect a mix of multiple-choice, short answer, vocabulary, and/or essay questions on the exams. Exams will cover ALL material (textbook, supplemental, and discussions) that have been covered up to the point of the exam.

Writing Assignments: There will be five short writing assignments that must be submitted through Safe Assignments. Each assignment should be completed using the critical and creative thinking model. Each assignment should be approximately two pages (Times New Roman font, double spaced) in length and should address all topics assigned.

Discussion Boards (DB): There will be six discussion board assignments for this class. Each student will be expected to contribute to each discussion. Each student will be expected to create a main post addressing all topics assigned on the discussion prompt. These postings will be similar to the short writing assignment and should be the same length. On the discussion board, you do not need to double space. These main posts will be due on the assigned Tuesday by 9:00 pm. Additionally, each student will be required to respond to posts by three other students. Responses can be as short as one paragraph, but needs to be more than, "I agree". Please ensure you explain why you agree or disagree. It is important to be respectful in your responses to other students.

Analytical Paper: The student will demonstrate basic writing skills and use of critical and creative thinking (CCT) in developing an individual Analytical Writing Paper. The paper will be based on a case study in crimes in disaster and should be six pages in length.

Reading Checks (RC): To ensure reading comprehension, weekly reading check quizzes will be conducted.
